

Baseball: Split at Coahulla doesn't hurt Panthers playoff chances

Dalton - Coahulla Creek snapped Union County's fourgame winning streak in the first game of a Monday, April 7 doubleheader, defeating Panthers' ace Gunnar Akins by a score of 6-2.

Union County (13-10, 9-5) bounced back in game two, rallying from a 3-0 deficit and escaped Dalton with a 6-4 extra-inning victory.

"I'm proud of the way we battled back and won that second game," Union County head coach Chris Robbins said. "That was a big win because who knows if we even get in the playoffs if we go over there and get swept. But I'm really pleased with the guys for never quitting. Last year's team would have quit."

Union County sits 14th among public schools (19th overall) in the GHSA's Class AA Postseason Rankings. The top 32 public schools will qualify for next week's Class AA State Tournament. Regardless of this week's outcomes, the Panthers look like they'll be back in the State tourney for the first time since 2022.

'I think we'll get into the playoffs, but sometimes I want to bite these kids' heads off; they don't understand that every moment matters,' Robbins said. "Every massive mistake has ramifications. We let Ringgold off the hook. We let Sonoraville off the hook. We let North Cobb Christian off the hook. You can't do that. It's the little things like that could come back and bite you."

Panthers 6, Coahulla Creek 4 - The Colts scored one run in each of the first three innings off starter Maddox Patton, taking a 3-0 advantage into the fifth. The Panthers scored two in the fifth, followed by one run apiece in the sixth and seventh to grab a 4-3 lead heading into Coahulla Creek's final half-inning.

A balk call on Patton tied the game with two away in the seventh, bringing Eli Gwynn to the mound for an inningending groundout.

Bentley Rich reached on an error to start the eighth and Gwynn's one-out triple moved Union County ahead. Patton's sacrifice fly brought



home Gwynn and awarded the visitors a 6-4 lead.

Gwynn punched out the leadoff hitter in the bottom half before giving up a base hit and inducing a pop-out. A twoout walk put the winning run aboard before Gwynn secured the win via a bouncer back to the mound.

Patton's night ended one out shy of a complete game, going 6 2/3 innings while giving up six hits, two earned runs, a walk and striking out four. At the plate, the junior went 2 for 3 with two RBIs, a run and a stolen base.

Gwynn picked up the win, surrendering one hit and one walk over 1 1/3 innings. He finished 1 for 4 with a run and an RBI triple at the dish.

Travis Tracy turned in a and an RBL

During the Coahulla Creek first, a costly two-out error put the Panthers in a 1-0 hole. And then, three straight singles and a sacrifice fly made it 2-0 in the second. The Colts made it 3-0 in the third courtesy of a one-out triple and a two-out single.

Consecutive one-out base hits by Rich and Tracy started off Union's two-run fifth, and then an error off the Haney and Bo Brown both

Akins delivered a two-out RBI single that scored Tracy and moved the Panthers within a run.

Patton pitched around two Union errors in the bottom half, and in the sixth, Colten Gibson doubled and knotted the score at 3-3 on Tracy's two-out single.

Coahulla Creek was sat down 1-2-3 in the bottom half of the sixth and Patton opened the seventh with an infield single. Akins worked a walk and Lane Haney's flyout moved Patton up 90 feet. Hayden Hughes followed with an RBI groundout to mount a 4-3 edge at the midway point of the seventh.

Patton came back out 2-for-4 day that included a run for the seventh and rendered a pop-fly to open the frame, but an error and a walk had the Colts in business with one away. A grounder back to Patton marked the second out, but a run-scoring balk, followed by a hit batter resulted in a pitching change.

Gibson went 1 for 4 with a double and a run; Rich scored twice and walked during a 1-for-3 night; Akins finished 1 for 4 with a walk and an RBI;

in a run.

Panthers 2, Coahulla Creek 6 - With Akins not having his best stuff and the Panthers eyeing their upcoming spring break, the Colts caught Union County on a perfect night for an upset during the first game of last week's region doubleheader.

'They hit Gunnar very well," Robbins said. "His pitch count was higher that usual and we could tell by the second inning he was having an off night. It's just one of those things. It happens."

As the home team in game one, Union County struck first with two runs in the second, taking advantage of two Coahulla Creek errors, followed by four consecutive singles by Rich, Tracy, Gwynn and Patton.

Unfortunately, Akins ran into trouble in the third, giving up a one-out double and then hitting the next batter on a 1-2 count. A base hit loaded the bags and an error put the Colts on the board before an RBI single and a sacrifice fly moved the Panthers into a 3-2 hole.

Hughes' one-out single went to waste in the third and Coahulla added on three more in the fifth via a hit batter, a

single The Panthers stranded two in the bottom half after an Akins walk and a Hughes base hit. They left two more aboard in the sixth when Gibson and Tracy both singled.

Gibson replaced Akins and worked around a hit batter and walk in the seventh but the Panthers were sat down 1-2-3 in their half of the inning.

Akins tossed five innings, giving up seven hits, six runs (three earned), two walks and two hit batters while striking out three. Gibson struck out two, allowed two hits and walked one over two scoreless.

Hughes and Tracy each finished 2 for 3 at the plate; Patton went 1 for 4 with an RBI; Gibson scored once during a 1-for-2 day; Rich finished 1 for 3 with a walk; Gwynn went 1 for 3 and drove in a run; Akins drew Union's only walk of the day.

Up next: Union County hosted Andrews, North Carolina on Monday in non-region play, looking to match the program's highest win total (14) in six years.

The Panthers close out the week and the regular season with a Friday night doubleheader at region-leading

"We're going to start getting ready [for Rockmart] on Tuesday," Robbins said. "We're not holding anything back. It's going to be a good challenge and hopefully we'll be stoked to play. Usually when you know a team is very good, that's who you look forward to playing. Hopefully that will get the kids riled up a little bit and excited to meet the challenge.'

Friday's doubleheader at 4th-ranked Rockmart gets underway at 5 p.m.

Young Harris Athletics not only secured multiple team wins this past week but snagged some individual honors as well! The national attention for Baseball's Jeremy Begora continues, as he adds another title to this name since last weekend. He earned the prestigious NCBWA National Player of the Week after his jaw-dropping performances at the plate.

Additionally, Begora's teammate Jonny Smith was recognized as Conference Carolinas' Baseball Freshman of the Month. The second baseman has been raking in the 2025 season, as he is slashing .408 at the plate, tallying 15 runs, 19 RBI, and two stolen bases. He has recorded nine multi-hit games this month, including a dominant four-hit, three-RBI performance in a win over Francis Marion. His impressive combination of average, power, and clutch hitting has been a cornerstone of the YH Baseball offense as the team prepares for the final stretch of the regular season. The team added another conference series win over King University April 4th & 5th while sweeping Union University in a midweek doubleheader on April 9th.

In a season-defining stretch, YH Women's Lacrosse pulled off a rankingshaking upset over Belmont Abbey and saw two of their own earn top honors – their biggest week yet. The Mountain Lions took down the former #1 Belmont Abbey Crusaders with a final score of 19-17 April 15th.

Young Harris had nine different goal scorers, but it was Riley Parker who led the charge with six goals. Conference Carolinas named Riley Parker "Player of the Week," and Goalkeeper Abbie Gallagher as "Defensive Player of the Week." Parker didn't only score the game-winning goal in overtime at Emmanuel, but has totaled 12 points over this duration. On the defensive side of the ball, Gallagher has saved an astounding 33 shots over the two games.

The Class AA girls will crown a state champion at Maple Ridge Golf Club in Columbus.


Mountain High Hikers Schedule


