Record number of students turn tassels at UCHS Class of 2019 graduation

A record 210 Union County High School seniors received their high school diplomas in 2019 – five graduated early, and 205 walked the walk during the student-led Commencement Exercises on Friday, May 24, in Mike Colwell Memorial Stadium.

Siblings, parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, friends and more filled the stadium on that warm Friday evening, and they proudly stood with hands over hearts as the High School Ensemble Choir sang "The Star-Spangled Banner."

Together, seniors

Madison Yost and Sahory Salazar delivered the welcome speech.

"We've gathered here to celebrate, and to specifically celebrate the successes of the Class of 2019," said Yost. "Over the course of this evening, we will recall and celebrate our academic and personal victories, all the while recognizing the challenges we have overcome and risen above."

Added Salazar, "No matter which route we have chosen for ourselves, hardships are inevitable.

"We have arrived at this day in large part because of our families, most of our petty and ungrateful days. So, to our

families and loved ones, I say thank you.

This ceremony marks the beginning of a new independence. May our passions and resilience guide this freedom, commemorating our past and fulfilling our futures. Enjoy these moments and this celebration."

A Moment of Reflection was shared by Jack Dalton and Claire McPherson as they skillfully took the Class of 2019 back through their years together, from primary school to the present, to the raucous laughter of everyone present.

McPherson reminded the Class of 2019 that they were UCHS Class of the Year their sophomore, junior and senior

years; the first class in UCHS history to do it three times.

Leilani Schroeder and Madelyn Sutton recited the class accomplishments.

"Thirteen years ago, this thing and this ceremony seemed like a lifetime away," said Schroeder. "Even nine months ago, at the beginning of our senior year, it still seemed like we had all the time in the world. But now, looking back, it feels as though it passed in the blink of an eye."

Schroeder recited the class accomplishments, from CTAE to all the colleges the Class of 2019 would be dispersing to, and Sutton called the names of all 18 graduates

Woody Gap School sends 2019 graduates out into the world




MECHS hosts inaugural joint graduation ceremony for all 16 sites
