#### **Distracted Driving**

Driving can be dangerous. You probably see potential car accidents every day. There are many causes of car accidents, but one major cause is distracted driving. We all are aware of something that has distracted us while we were driving. It could be the radio, other occupants, eating, and the worst thing... your cellphone. Union County Fire Department responds to many motor vehicle accidents, and we would like to make people aware of the

risks associated with distracted driving.

Anything that diverts the driver's attention from the operation of the vehicle is considered a distraction. Distracted driving is broken down into four main categories: auditory, cognitive, manual, and visual. Auditory distrac-



tions include hearing or listening to something not related to driving. This could be phone calls or music. Cognitive distractions refer to anything that takes your mind off your driving or prevents you from maintaining situational awareness. This could be phone calls as well or something like the lack of sleep that reduces your reaction time. Manual distractions are physically doing anything that takes your hands off the steering wheel such as eating, applying makeup, or holding your cellphone while driving. Visual distractions are looking at something other than the road. These can include books, text messages or videos

The main distracted driver activity that comes to mind is using the cellphone to call, text, email, or even browse the internet while driving. Cellphone use can involve all four distractions of auditory, cognitive, manual, and visual. This distraction takes your eyes off the road and/or prevents you from concentrating on the driving. Even if you are just talking on the phone, your mind is distracted because you are concentrating on the conversation.

How dangerous of a distraction is texting and driving? An article by Jacob Masters of the Brain Injury Society compares texting and driving to drinking and driving. The article states that, "Drivers who are texting while behind the wheel have a 23% higher chance of causing a crash. That is equivalent to downing four beers and then get-ting behind the wheel." We have campaigned for many years to stop drunk driving due to the accidents that it causes, now we need to do the same for texting and driving.

Please keep this in mind the next time you get behind the wheel.

#### Ayaan Ali Part Two

After Ayaan Hirsi Ali wrote, "Why I Am Now a Christian," she met her friend Richard Dawkins in a public forum. Here are two intellectuals, one current and one former atheist, having "The God Debate." It was raw, personal, and oddly affectionate.

After Ali suffered a decade of emotional distress, her therapist suggested the problem was spiritual bankruptcy. "You've

lost hope," the therapist said. So Ali prayed. This became a turning point that led to her miracle, emotional healing. But Dawkins wasn't having it. "You go to church now and listen to the vicar. Do you notice what a lot of nonsense he talks? I mean, do you really take it seriously that Jesus is



the Son of God? That Jesus rose from the dead? Jesus was born

Her rejoinder was insightful and instructive. "You're coming at this from a place of: there is nothing," she said. "I have accepted there is something. God turned me around. What the vicar is saying no longer sounds nonsensical. It makes a great deal of sense. It's also layered with the wisdom of millennia." She's saying only when you assume away God can the supernatural be considered nonsensical. But that is "begging the question," i.e., basing your conclusion on an unproven assumption.

#### The Chase

I don't know about you, but, I always dreaded the day of our polio vaccinations at school. The process didn't hurt. But, I was always scared of those needles. My hypothesis is that being scared of those vaccinations was a part of my DNA. My father was scared of doctors, dentists and

even nurses. When Dad was really young he had a bad toothache, so, Papa took my Dad to a friend



who could pull teeth. This man was not a dentist. He never went to any dentistry schools. But, in the mid-1940s, the closest dentist to Trapptown, Alabama, was in Birmingham. So, the only alternative was a trip to Mon Dye's house. Papa said, Mon had worked on horses' teeth, so, he knew a little about teeth. Papa and Mr. Dye strapped Dad to a chair, and without any novocaine, he pulled one of the young boy's teeth. As a result, my father has had a fear of dentists

since he was 7 years old. After WWII the Health Departments in Alabama began vaccinating school-age children for varied maladies. Some kids went to school and some did not. So, health workers would pick out a community leader's home and go there to give vaccinations to all the kids in that community. The vaccinations were free, and most of the younger generation wanted their kids to receive the vaccinations. But, the older generation was not convinced. My greatgrandmother, Laura West, was afraid for her

So, upon the arrival of her grandchildren on the vaccination day, Laura ushered them into her home and had them convinced their blood would leak out of their bodies if they were given a shot. When it was announced the County Nurse had arrived to give the vaccines, Jimmy WeHunt ran for the woods. Wallace and Freda began to squall with an extremely high pitch. Dad and Bud ran for Laura's bedroom and dove under her big old bed. All this commotion had a profound effect upon the other kids in the community. Kids were running and screaming for their lives. Papa was the first father to catch his children.

He said, "I reched under the bed while my mother, Laura, was hitting me with the broom handle and grabbed them boys by their ankles. I pulled them from under the bed and carried them by the ankles outside to the nurse. The whole time they sounded like little pigs a squealing." Dad and Bud knew not to run anymore, but, they were still scared. As the nurse reached for the arm of Bud, with tears stream-

#### Sweet Corn

It's hard to beat the taste of fresh sweet corn. Sweet corn in the summer that was just picked is hard to beat. Even though it gets stuck in my teeth I won't complain because each kernel is bursting with flavor. While there are many different varieties of sweet corn some still ring

as old favorites like Silver King, Silver Queen, or Peaches and Cream. Let's talk about sweet corn today, some of the differences and some of the challenges with growing it.



One of the biggest challenges to growing sweet corn is the corn earworm. This is a caterpillar that will eat the kernels at the end of the cob. They are laid as eggs on the silks of the ear and make their way inside the husk while they are still very small. Once inside they begin to eat and grow. They get to be about 34 of an inch long. It is very common to see their damage on sweet corn that was grown locally. If you see damage from them on the ear, don't panic. Simply break or cut off the damaged portion and eat the rest of the ear. To prevent corn earworm damage requires a lot of insecticide spray. So, if you see some damage you can take that as confirmation that the grower did not use a lot of insecticides to grow the corn.

There are three main classes of sweet corn: standard sugary, sugar enhanced, and supersweet. Standard sugary contains many of the classic varieties that people are familiar with like Silver Queen. One of the limitations of this class is that the sugars convert from sugar to starch within a few days after harvest, so they have a very short shelf life. Sugar enhanced varieties have a more tender and creamy texture. These varieties also have more sugar in them so the shelf life is a few days longer than the standard sugar. Bodacious and Temptation are two examples of varieties in this class. This class is usually used for direct retail or wholesale. The supersweet class has seeds that look more wrinkled. The conversion of sugar to starch in this class is slower, so the corn can be stored for a bit longer. Up to 10 days of storage. The kernels can be a bit tougher. Obsession, Devotion, and Xtra-Tender are some examples of varieties in this class. There are some varieties that are synergistic, meaning they have been bred using a combination of the other classes.

Corn needs to be grown in isolation to maintain kernel color and sweetness. Either varieties should be isolated by 250 feet or the planting timing should be done so that they tassel 14 days apart. Yellow pollen is the dominant color in corn. So, to maintain white varieties they need to

that we should consider?

A. The negative aspects of growth are fairly evident. It's the positive aspects of growth that are often overlooked. Please understand that by discussing these positive aspects, I'm not saying that we shouldn't be cautious; I'm only saying we should try to keep things in balance.

#1. Most understand that a large portion of our population base is older/retired. This means that a smaller portion are young or school aged. At first glance, this difference doesn't carry a great deal of significance, but when you step back to get a cross-section perspective of our county, you realize that we need these young people. These are our idea people. These are our technology people. The young working population provides the services we older people often demand. For this reason, the school system needs to continue to grow. As the older population grows, we need a proportionate amount of growth in our school system.

#2. Our hospital needs to grow in order to medically support the entire population. If the hospital does not grow, how are we going to provide medical care to our aging population? Do we want to drive back and forth to Gainesville or Atlanta for basic medical care because there are not enough workers to care for us?

#3. A similar point can be made for public safety. Right now, we have job openings with the Fire Department and the Sheriff's Office. These jobs require healthy young people who can meet the rigorous job demands such as pulling families out of burning houses and securing our property. For this reason, our public safety departments need to grow. We can't do this without a healthy pool of qualified job applicants. If we aren't "grow-

ing our own," then people have to move here to meet the job demands.

#4. Some of our residents seem to feel differently about this topic, but I occasionally hear people complain about the traffic and growth in our county and then say, "I wish we had a Publix or Kroger, etc., store in the county." The only way these stores come to a community is if they have a certain amount of population growth and wealth. We also have to provide a labor market (potential employees). I think many of us sometimes

want it both ways. Q. How do we stop growth?

A. You cannot stop growth, and if you do, it cannot be done without negatively impacting those of us who already live here. Since I have been in office, my goal has always been to increase our quality of life by improving roads, public safety, public facilities, library, farmers market, horse arena, and parks, etc. The only problem is that as we make the county better for those of us already here, it is also an attraction to those looking for a great community to move to. Take into consideration the requirement of minimum lot sizes for septic, strict building codes, few multi-family dwellings, protection of farmlands and forestry land etc. So much of our current population moved here within the last 30 years. Who has the right to draw a line in the sand to tell others they can't move here too? While we want to keep our growth rate at a reasonable level, some growth is inevitable. We cannot legally put up a gate on Hwy 515; We cannot prevent people from other places from buying a second home in Union County. Government wants to do what is best for everyone, but it can

After the vaccination Bud looked surprised when he realized his blood wasn't leaking out of his body. The vaccinations for the other kids took a while because their Dads all had to chase and catch their children. But, eventually all the kids received their vaccinations, and everything calmed down in the little community.

Here in Blairsville, many old timers will remember Doc Edge. His place was on the south side of town at the top of the hill close to where the bypass is now located. During the 1940s and '50s there was a County Agent here by the name of Spud Wellborn. Spud had a son that was a very good friend of mine named Mike. The family lived close to where Faith Church is now located. Mike came down with something and was taken to Doc Edge. He and his father were told he needed a shot of something, probably sulfa or penicillin. The little boy watched

the doctor pull out a syringe and stick it into a vial to pull in the medicine. He said, "Mickey, that thing looked like it was a foot long." So he bolted out the back door as his Daddy yelled, "Boy, get back in here." The little boy ran for the woods, and then he heard the Doc tell his dog to round up the boy. The Boxer dog followed the boy and herded him just like a sheep. Mike told me, "The dog followed right on my heels, and we made a large loop right back into the office of Doc Edge." Mike took the shot and afterwards told me, "That dog laid his head in my lap as if he felt sorry for me.'

ed to question Balaam. Then G-d opened Balaam's eyes to see the angel, who warned him again to speak only what G-d commands.

In Moab, Balak took Balaam to various high places overlooking the Israelite camp, hoping to aid in the cursing of the Children of Israel. However, each time Balaam attempted to curse the Israelites. G-d inspired him to bless them instead. Three times Balaam blessed the Israelites, extolling their virtues and foretelling their future greatness. Frustrated, Balak chastised Balaam for blessing his enemies. Balaam replied he can only speak the words G-d puts in his mouth. Before leaving, Balaam prophesied the future downfall of Moab and other nations opposed to Israel.

It is a story of how G-d provides for the people who cleave to Him, and how He can literally turn curses into blessings. But the Rebbe, Rabbi Menachem M. Schneerson, of righteous memory, the most influential rabbi in modern his-

tory, noted a deeper message. There are two leading figures in the Torah that are mentioned as coming from the territory of Aram, present-day northwest Iraq. The first is the Patriarch Abraham, while the other is our antagonist Balaam. And without suggesting any comparison in holiness or morality between them, the Rebbe noted some parallels between

In Genesis, when G-d tested Abraham by seeing how he would respond to being asked to sacrifice his only son Isaac, we are told that Abraham "rose early" and "saddled his donkey" himself, showing his eagerness and passion to obey G-d's will, even though he didn't understand it. By contrast, in our story of Balaam, we are again told that he "saddled his donkey." But here, we learn, it wasn't because he was inspired by positive feelings to go on his mission. Rather, it was because he was overwhelmed by hate, to the point he had no regard for his own dignity in his

rush to express that hatred. Two people, from the same place, doing the same ac-
