Attention students: Ready or not, here comes school!

Union County Schools are back in session this week, so watch out for kids at bus stops starting Friday morning.

Classes officially begin on Friday, Aug. 4, though teachers will spend Monday through Thursday in preplanning ahead of Meet Your Teacher night, which runs from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m. on Thursday, Aug. 3, at all schools.

The No. 1 goal of the chool system remains the same to start the 2017-2018 school year, according to Union County Schools Superintendent Dr. Fred Rayfield.

"And that's maximizing student achievement," said Dr. Rayfield. "Our second goal is something that I think all of our folks are concentrating on in multiple ways, which is community and stakeholder engagement."

After school let out in May, Dr. Rayfield and other administrators gathered for an administrative retreat, and the consensus established in that retreat formed the basis of his second systemwide goal.

"You'll see a good bit of effort there in retooling and redoing our websites so that they're more user friendly and there's much more information out there day to day," said Dr. Rayfield.

The board office has also made a previously part-time parental involvement position into a full-time, systemwide position to further engagement efforts on the home front.

"Our third goal is to try to close that achievement gap, and make sure that we do everything we can for our economically disadvantaged

students to be as successful as other students," said Dr. Rayfield.

At the high school, Principal C.T. Hussion said that he and his staff are ready to embrace the new school year.

Construction crews have been working this summer on a couple of projects at the high school, including new HVAC retrofitting, which Hussion said has made a real difference in maintaining a consistent temperature throughout the school.

Furthermore, the secondfloor addition to the C-wing is about 50 percent complete, and Hussion said he's hopeful it will be finished by December.

"We'll have alternate routes for students to avoid construction areas, and they'll be building throughout the first semester," said Hussion.

YOUNG HARRIS Georgia Lt. Gov. Casey Cagle hopes to win the 2018 race for governor, and he's using a positive economic message to sway potential voters.

Cagle spoke to a roomful of constituents on Friday, July 28, during the Georgia Cattlemen's Association's summer conference at The Ridges Resort & Marina.

Starting with a wideangle approach to the Georgia economy, Cagle highlighted the importance of the Port of Savannah and improving other infrastructure in the state, before zooming in on agribusiness, a keen interest of those attending the Cattlemen's

Property values up, county to accept rollback millage rate

Union County Sole Commissioner Lamar Paris is set to accept a rollback millage rate of 5.786 ahead of 2017 property tax bills.

The 2017 rate is 0.002 mills lower than the 2016 rate, though the county will be collecting \$107,172 more in tax dollars this year than in 2016, thanks to an increased tax digest.

The commissioner will set the rate in a meeting that will begin at 6 p.m. on Thursday, Aug. 10, inside the Union County Courthouse.

According to the 2017 tax digest, the total county value of properties is about \$1.237

Over the next three years, Advanced Digital Cable will be adding up to 65 new jobs at its Blairsville facility.

'Most of our jobs will be locally sourced, people that walk in and bring an application in the door," said ADC Vice President Cory Payne. "All the manufacturing workers will be from the Tri-County area, but Blairsville as much as possible, because we don't want people driving a long distance to get to work.
