The award, presented

by the Georgia Association of Regional Commissions, recognizes significant contributions to the North Georgia Mountains region.

The winner of the first Zell Miller Appalachian Hero Award was none other than the former Georgia governor and United States senator, Zell Miller, making the honor mean that much more to Paris.

"It's an honor to receive

any award for recognition on a regional or statewide basis," Paris said. "It makes it even more special when that award is named after Zell Miller."

No matter your taste, there were plenty of local artists on hand to suit your fancy.


The Downtown Spring Arts and Crafts Festival is becoming quite a phenomenon and one of the many highlights of Blairsville's Memorial Day Weekend.
